ATTENDANCE AND SUCCESS

Please know that everyone at TEC does everything we can to provide a positive, stimulating environment for your child everyday. We know that a child's earliest experiences with school will have lasting impacts for their entire life. The same can be said for their attendance history. Please take a few minutes and carefully read the article below to learn just how important daily attendance is to your child's present and future experiences.

IMPORTANCE OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Attending school regularly will help your child feel better about school—and themselves.

Your child can start building this habit in kindergarten so they learn right away

that going to school on time, every day is a requirement not an option.


Consistent attendance in the earliest grades helps children do well in high school, college, and at work.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences (excused and unexcused) can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) increases the chance that your student will not read or master math at the same level as their peers.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance and sends a poor message.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By being present at school, your child learns valuable social skills and has the opportunity to develop meaningful relationships with other students and school staff.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school or struggling with school work.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.

WHAT YOU CAN DO AS A PARENT OR GUARDIAN

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Prepare for school the night before: finish homework & get plenty of sleep.
- Consistent, established routines make everyone's life easier.
- Don't let your student stay home unless they are truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- Avoid appointments and extended trips when school is in session.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Keep track of your student's attendance. Days add up quickly!
- Talk to your child about the importance of attendance.
- Talk to your child's teacher if you notice sudden changes in behavior.
- Encourage participation in before and after school activities.

The Kindergarten Classes were so excited as they reached the big milestone of 100 Days of School. They all came together to celebrate the big day. 2nd Grade

THIRD GRADE STUDENTS EXPLORE WEATHER

The weather turned quite cloudy in the third grade pod when Mr. Eisler's science students explored weather and created displays of the three basic types of clouds. During the unit on weather, students learned about the water cycle, types of clouds, the different states of water, and the different sources of water on Earth. In addition, each student completed a five day weather journal, which tracked the weather conditions in Pocono Pines. The unit culminated with students creating and displaying projects on the different types of clouds.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA


4TH GRADE



Fourth Grade students are preparing for the 50 States Map Quiz by playing various 50 states games and interactive online map game.

They are learning about the Southeast region of the United States. While traveling down South, they are learning about the climate and geography of the area. To encourage learning, students are playing a variety of fun games in class. (Game of the States, Race Across the U.S.A, Kids Puzzle of the United States, USA Bingo, & The Scrambled States of America Game) The games have been available during indoor recess and it is amazing how many students have asked to use the games during their own free time!

When choosing what language to learn, whether in 7th, 8th or 9th grade, German is one that students and parents should consider for a variety of interesting and practical reasons!



PROBLEM SOLVING IN SCHOOL

RESTORATIVE CIRCLES

Restorative Circles allow us to bring students together to address one time incidents or ongoing problems as deemed appropriate. In order for a circle to be facilitated to solve the problem all parties must be agreeable to use this method to solve the problem. Each student is asked if they would like to get together to discuss and solve the problem. The purpose of the circle is to allow all parties to be heard from their perspective. The circle is run by at least one principal, one counselor and all parties involved including the child(ren). We have done circles with parents, bus drivers, other administrators, teachers, substitute teachers and monitors. When we are in a circle the following questions are asked; What happened?, What were you thinking at the time?, What have you thought about since?, Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?, What do you think you need to do to make things right? Each individual has an opportunity to answer these questions and they may answer or pass. After the questions are asked the dialogue continues as deemed appropriate. The goal is for everyone to walk away feeling heard and able to go on being comfortable.





STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

What Is SAP?

A SAP team made up of school and agency staff is available to help you access school and community services for your child. In Pennsylvania, every school district is required to have a plan for identifying and assisting students who experience barriers to learning. The TEC SAP team will help you find services and assistance within the school, and if needed, in the community. We do not diagnose, treat, or refer your child for treatment. We will provide you with information and you make the choice that best fit your needs and wishes. As the parent/guardian you are an important part of the team. The SAP team information is completely confidential and the team will respect you and your child's privacy at all times. 




