PMSD teams earn high marks on World stage

The results are in, and Pocono Mountain School District's teams earned worldwide recognition in the Odyssey of the Mind World Finals at Michigan State University over Memorial Day Weekend.

Pocono Mountain's teams, two from PM East Junior High School and one from PM East High School, earned recognition among their peers from across the United States and around the world by placing 3rd in Problem 5, The Most Dramatic Problem Ever!!! Division II, 5th in Problem 1 Pirates and the Treasure Division II, and 9th in Problem 5 The Most Dramatic Problem Ever!!! Division III.

"We are very proud of all of our teams who competed in Odyssey of the Mind this year, and exceptionally proud of our three teams who went to the World Finals and showcased their amazing talents on the world stage," said Dr. Catherine Sweeney, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction.

The theatrical problem team from PM East Junior High made it all the way onto the winners' podium by placing 3rd out of 65 teams for Problem 5, The Most Dramatic Problem Ever!!! Division II. The team, consisting of 8th graders Jenna Pyke, Alorah Badman, Camille Hubbs, Declan Angulo and 7th graders Hayden Christman and Sophia Hernandez and coached by Teacher Advisors, Jennifer Fiore and Galen Smith, earned the highest score of any team in the Problem 5 competition in the long-term problem and style portions of their team scores. The team was also the top finishing team from the United States in this Problem and Division at the World Finals. The students competed against teams from across the United States and international teams from Poland, China, Hong Kong and South Korea. This is the highest finish of a Pocono Mountain Odyssey of the Mind team at the World Finals, since the district first began offering the program as an afterschool activity for students in 2007.

"It was so amazing to be recognized

as the 3rd place team in the world and the first in the United States!," said Hayden Christman. "It was a dream to cross the stage in front of thousands of people representing countries from all over the World but the best part was working together with my friends to make it there."

The vehicle problem team from PM East Junior High School earned 5th place in Problem 1. Pirates of the Treasure Division II out of 61 teams from around the world, including Switzerland, Japan, China, South Korea, Poland Mexico and Hong Kong. The team consisted of 8th graders Cole Clifford, Connor Smith, Lucas Angst, William Bock, Justice Cook, Julia Mancini and 7th grader Alissa Gilliland, and was coached by Teacher Advisors Mrs. Fiore and Mr. Smith.

"It was great to work as a team to engineer a solution that allowed for another student and myself to ride on a homemade vehicle that cost less than \$100," said Cole Clifford. "We also built a vacuum that could pick up smaller props and a cannon that launched plastic bottles that the judges

complimented us on. At the competition our performance went perfectly and the whole team did a great job. It was so nice to meet students from all over the country and the world. It was such a great experience and we were so grateful for this opportunity."

The theatrical problem team from PM East High School placed 9th in Problem 5. The Most Dramatic Problem Ever!!! Division III out of 42 teams around the world, including teams from Hong Kong and Germany. The East HS team consisted of Seniors Marisa DeLano, Emily Farley, Christopher Fisher, Katherine Gude, Jessica Rinaldi and Lauren Waldstein, and Freshman Kailey Clifford, and was coached by Teacher Advisor Kevin Semian.

"The team was very pleased with placing in the top ten at the World Finals. This team has been resilient all season, always 'upping' their game," said Mr. Semian. "The team consisted of six seniors, for all but one, it was their first time competing at the World Finals. It was an amazing way for them to end their Odyssey of the Mind experience at East High School. I am so very proud of all of them!"

The path to the World Finals includes intense regional and state competitions. Each team had to score high enough in their problem and division to advance from the Northeast PA competition to the Pennsylvania competition, and then repeat that success at the state competition to go to the World Finals.

"Through the years I've had the privilege to see the impact that OoTM has had on our students even after graduation," said Mrs. Fiore. "Odyssey of the Mind truly prepares students for tomorrow's challenges and opportunities by fostering a diligent work ethic, creative problem solving, confidence, and leadership skills. Some of our proud alumni include research scientists, educators, computer engineers at Google, and a chief navigator for the United States Navy."

Pocono Mountain School District offers Odyssey of the Mind as an afterschool activity open to students in grades 4 to 12. Students try out to be part of these creative problem-solving teams. Each student brings their own individual talents to the team, which may include mechanical or building skills, artistic skills, problem-solving skills, and many other Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics (STEAM) skills and talents needed to take on the challenges of the Odyssey of the Mind problems that change every year.

The 2022-23 school year was a school year filled with so many successes for our students, staff, schools and the district, all culminating in wonderful graduation ceremonies for our East and West High School Class of 2023. I am so proud of our graduates and excited for them as they embark on their posthigh school journeys. I am hopeful that some of our graduates will return to Pocono Mountain School District (PMSD) as new teachers in a few years. Each year the Administration and the Board are excited to welcome former students back into the district as the next generation of teachers. There is something especially gratifying for all of us when our students choose to enter the profession of teaching and we can welcome them back home to PMSD.

When we look at the numerous accomplishments across the district throughout the 2022-2023 school year, we can be very proud of the hard work and efforts of our students and staff. Once again, PMSD has continued to build upon and expand opportunities available to students of all abilities, so all students have the chance to succeed academically and grow socially.

Student success doesn't happen in isolation. It takes a strong support group for students to reach their greatest potential while at school. This message was emphasized by our students during the June 3, 2023, instructional report on eSports and again in the graduation speeches of our 2023 East and West class presidents, salutatorians and valedictorians. We heard from students who wanted to find a place within our schools where they could fit in and excel, and a place to talk to other students about common interests and be supported. The place where they feel most supported and who is part of their support group may be different for each student. However, the common theme from all of the students was a need to fit in with a supportive group while at school and participating in school activities.

A challenge for all schools is how to encourage and sustain student engagement in school. Teachers and administrators know from experience that student engagement is critical to the ongoing success of students, both academically and emotionally. Research also shows that student engagement is a critical component of success in school.

According to the National Center for Safe and Supportive Learning Environments, "Student engagement is a key element of a positive school climate, with a large body of research linking it to academic achievement. Students demonstrate behavioral engagement through actions such as consistent attendance, completing assignments, coming to class prepared, and participating in class and in school activities."

Student engagement and involvement in their schools and connectedness with their teachers, other students and schools is so important it is measured as part of Pennsylvania Youth Survey of risk behaviors. Pocono Mountain students in grades 6, 8, 10 and 12 completed the 2021



Pennsylvania Youth Survey (PAYS). This survey provides district administrators and instructional directors and supervisors with valuable insight into the possible risk behaviors of students and other important issues that impact students, including a series of questions on community and school climate which measure student commitment to school, the perceived importance of school, and student involvement in pro-social activities, all considered key components of student connectedness to their schools and strong student engagement in school.

Overall, 72.4 percent of PMSD students in grades

6, 8, 10 and 12 reported that "there are a lot of chances for students in my school to talk one-on-one with a teacher." A higher percentage of students answered yes on this question than in the previous survey from 2019. However, we have more work to do to reach the students who felt their schools did not provide a lot of chances to talk one-on-one with a teacher or who weren't confident enough to approach their teachers. Our principals, guidance departments, teachers and instructional directors and supervisors have already begun making improvements at our schools through the addition of mentoring programs and student check-in programs to help ensure all students feel confident that they can talk to a teacher one-on-one when needed.

A larger percentage of district students (82.2 percent overall) agreed with the statement "I have a lot of chances to be part of the class discussion or activities," and 77 percent of students overall agreed that "I feel safe at my school," both considered indicators of a positive school environment. As with the survey results on student perception on opportunities to talk to teachers, our administrative team won't be satisfied until all students feel they can be part of a class discussion or activities and feel safe at school.

According to the PAYS developers, "Giving students opportunities to participate in important activities at school helps to create a feeling of personal investment in their school. This increased investment results in greater bonding and adoption of the school's standard of behavior, reducing the likelihood that the students will become involved in problem behaviors. Students who demonstrate a lack of commitment to school are more likely to have ceased viewing being a student as a positive role. These students have a higher risk for a variety of problem behaviors."

PAYS results are just some of the various data points and measurements PMSD administrators use to help evaluate school climate and determine if adjustments are needed in student programming and supports to not only address evolving student risk behaviors, but to also ensure all students have the opportunity to participate in meaningful activities that provide them with a positive support group and make them feel more connected to their schools. In the back-to-school issue of the PMSD Connection, that will be published in August, we will provide a list of all of the afterschool activities, clubs and sports offered to students in our PMSD schools. I ask parents to please review the list of activities with their children and encourage their children to try at least one activity next school year. The district really does try to offer activities and clubs that are as varied as the interests of our students.

Also, if you know about a student who is struggling and needs help this summer, please don't hesitate to use the Safe2Say Something (S2SS) anonymous reporting system (Adults and students may report tips anonymously through the Office of Attorney General's 24/7 Crisis Center [1-844-SAF2SAY], through a mobile app, or through Pennsylvania's Safe2Say Something website www.safe2saypa.org.) to report your concerns about bullying, harmful or threatening student behavior, or school safety. S2SS is operational all summer, and our administrative team is prepared to respond to any tips to keep our students safe.

Board of Education has change in director for Region 3



Board approves resolution for 2023 property tax relief

The Pocono Mountain School District (PMSD) Board of Education approved a 2023 Homestead & Farmstead Exclusion Resolution at the June 21, 2023 public School Board Meeting that outlined the amount approved district property owners will receive in property tax relief on their 2023 property tax bills.

The Homestead Farmstead Real Estate Tax reduction is part of Pennsylvania's broad-based property tax relief provided from gaming funds through the Taxpayer Relief Act, also known as Special Session Act 1 of 2006.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) notified district officials that PDE will provide the district with \$7,824,277.58 in gaming tax funds to use for property tax reduction for 13,154 approved homesteads and six approved farmsteads for a total of 13,160 approved homestead/farmsteads in the district.

"PMSD acts as a pass through for gaming tax relief funds," said Joseph Colozza, Chief Financial Officer. "The funds allocated to the district are then reallocated to qualified property owners to reduce their school property taxes."


The property tax relief for approved property owners in the district for 2023 will be \$598.13 per homestead or farmstead within the district's boundaries.

Checks will not be issued directly approved property owners. Homeowners with an approved Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion will see the exclusion amount deducted from their property taxes on their 2023 property tax bills.

Gaming funds dedicated to property tax relief also pay for a Philadelphia Wage Tax reduction, Philadelphia Senior Citizen Property Tax reduction, allocation to school districts for the Philadelphia Wage Credit, expanded Senior Citizen Property Tax & Rent Rebate Program, and the state allocation to the remaining school districts.

The amount of gaming funds dedicated to property tax relief varies each year, which means the amount of property tax relief for approved property owners will also vary each year.

Who will receive the tax relief: Generally, most owner-occupied homes and farms are eligible for property tax reduction. Only a primary residence is eligible for property tax relief. For property owners to receive this tax relief they would have had to file a Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion

application with the Monroe County Assessment Office by March 1, 2023, and received a notice back that their application was approved. Any property owner who received property tax relief last year will still qualify. They do not have to reapply each year.

What happens to property owners who didn't apply for the Homestead/ **Farmstead Exclusion:**

For those property owners who have not filed their Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion application, district officials encourage them to do so in order to be eligible for tax relief the next time funding is available. If they apply today and their application is approved, they will not qualify for this year's tax relief, but will qualify for any future tax relief when available.

According to the High School Program of Studies, students can choose from 18 different art electives to add to their class schedules this year. From Ceramics to Digital Photography to Art Exploration through STEAM, there is sure to be a class for any student wanting to begin their journey in the arts or for experienced artists looking to refine their skills and challenge themselves to try something new.

For the 2023-2024 school year, a new Art elective is available for 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students -Digital Journalism. This course will be co-taught by an Art and an English Language Arts teacher and is designed to create the digital school magazine which is produced biannually. In Digital Journalism students will learn the concepts of newsworthiness and press responsibility and develop their skills in writing, editing, photography, graphic design, layout, and digital publishing.

A chosen Pathway can help focus a student's elective courses toward preparing for a specific goal area." The areas of focus for the Arts and Communication Pathway include: AV Technology and Film, Performing Arts, Visual Arts, and Journalism and Broadcasting.

Students interested in art should also consider getting involved in our extracurricular art opportunities. Our annual musical production seeks students interested in set design, and our National Art Honor Society (NAHS) is a great opportunity for eligible students to participate in community service projects at the elementary

and intermediate schools and in our greater school community such as at the Clymer Library. Our National Art Honor Society also participates in field trips to art museums, face painting at school and community events, and in student-designed clothing and pin fundraisers.

Mrs. Miele-Beatty suggests that the easiest way to get involved in the arts is to take a level one art class such as Ceramics I, Drawing I, or Painting I. She and the other teachers in our art department are constantly looking for ways to help students build their creative problem-solving skills, careerreadiness, and a variety of soft skills.

Our art department works hard to provide creative opportunities for their students to participate in, including art exhibits and contests, virtual speakers and tours, college visits, and other educational field trips. Many of the Swiftwater Intermediate students had never participated in any on-stage performances before this musical.





Understanding the PA Junior Academy of Science program & how it promotes STEM

The Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science (PJAS) provides an opportunity for students with an interest in STEM research to stretch their intellectual proficiency.

The program is open to all junior and senior high school students.

Pocono Mountain School District continues to have great success with students participating, learning and thriving in PJAS competitions!

In preparation for the regional meeting, students select a research topic in science, math, or computer science. After choosing the research conduct their own experiment.

Students collect and analyze their data and prepare a formal presentation. They present their research at the regional competition at Wilkes University where students compete against established criteria in their chosen research area.

Students earning first award are then invited to present their research at the State competition on the Main Campus of Penn State University.

This year, Pocono Mountain School District took 23 students to the regional competition in Wilkes-Barre where 19 first awards were earned along with four second place awards.





Next school year, students will use the Classroom Dojo points they earn, instead of PRIDE Cards, to participate in the PRIDE Carnival, like the one held for students in 2022-23.

SIS Classroom Dojo supports PRIDE initiatives

Swiftwater Intermediate School finished its first school year utilizing Classroom Dojo. Following a trial year with only a handful of teachers, the schoolwide positive behavior system was implemented in all classrooms during the 2022-2023 school year. Classroom Dojo has replaced PRIDE Cards as a unit of currency to purchase items from the schoolwide menu, classroom menus and the PRIDE store.

Teachers award Classroom Dojo points to students who demonstrate the five components of the PRIDE Matrix: Prepared, Respectful, Involved, Dependable Empathetic. Parents who signed up to receive Dojo messages are made aware when their student gets a point added to their account through push notifications. The Dojo points are then available to purchase

various items from the menu options and the school store. In addition, there are quarterly school wide activities where these points can be redeemed to participate in additional experiences. The PRIDE spring carnival held at the end of the school year is the final opportunity for students to spend these points. Any Dojo points students have remaining after the carnival can be used for a chance to win prizes via a student raffle.

Next school year, Classroom Dojo will continue to be the foundation of the Swiftwater Intermediate School's Positive School-wide Behavior system. Parents are encouraged to sign up for notifications, as many teachers also use this as a means to communicate important school and classroom information. Look for the sign-up information with next year's first day paperwork.

Strategies for a successful summer break

Tips for managing your kids' downtime to help make it relaxing for everyone

While your child may be thrilled by the end of the school year, anticipating lazy days and sleeping in, the prospect of summer break is not quite that unalloyed pleasure for parents.

Here are some tips to help keep your child on track so summer can be as rewarding as possible for everyone in the family:

Kids do better with structure. That's even more true for kids with emotional or developmental issues. Therefore, summer break can be a challenge for kids and their parents. But following some basic rules can make summer easier to handle and more fun for everyone.

Keeping to your child's usual mealtimes is bedtimes and important. Posting the day's schedule helps kids move from one activity to another. Planning activities ahead of time, like going to the playground or pool every day, gives kid structure they can depend on. Then you can schedule other activities around that.

Rules for behavior are important, too. It is good to pick a few "good" behaviors you want your child to work on. You can reward kids for good behaviors with stickers or a special outing. And ignoring as many minor "bad" behaviors as you can teaches kids that acting out won't get them what they want.

Meet-ups and other on-line groups are a great way of connecting your child with other kids and families who might make good matches for playdates. Outdoor activities are important for kids. If day camp is an option, it can provide great structure and fun outdoor activities that keep kids from spending too much time in front of screens. If a kid has anxiety, it's good to figure out what is triggering it. Then you can take baby steps to make those fears less

Even if you do everything you can to prepare for summer, it's normal for kids to act out more over vacation. That's tiring for parents. It's important for parents to take care of themselves during the long summer break, too. Hiring a sitter for a few hours or asking family members to pitch in can make a big difference.

Assistive technology improves accessibility for all students

Pocono Mountain School District (PMSD) prides itself on providing an educational environment that welcomes students of all abilities.

One of the ways PMSD helps make opportunities available for students with disabilities is through the use of assistive technology.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education Basic Education Circular on Assistive Technology describes assistive technology as "any item, piece of equipment, or product system, whether acquired commercially off the shelf, modified, or customized, that is used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of children with disabilities."

One such assistive technology device that is making a difference for students in Pocono Mountain East High School Art Teacher Molly Callahan's class is a specialized table-top pottery wheel.

"The ceramic program at PMSD is not only a great way for students to be creative, but what many people don't realize is that it is also an amazing way to build fine motor skills and help students build muscle strength in their hands," said Mrs. Callahan. "For some students who need occupational therapy services, the ceramics classroom helps provide additional means of gaining these strengths and skills. But upon having a student in my class who was wheelchair bound, I realized that we needed to do more to ensure that the studio was equipped to help all students be able to participate in the curriculum. Since our pottery wheels are tripods, it would be impossible for a student with a wheelchair to use them. So, it was clear that we needed to get a more specialized wheel to ensure all students could create. A tabletop pottery wheel made it possible. Now students can create wheel-thrown pottery in a comfortable way."

Assistive and adaptive technology are not just a consideration for the classroom. Something as simple as adding yellow tape to the steps in stairwells can make a big difference for students with depth perception challenges navigate stairwells in schools safely.

"We strive to make our schools as accessible as possible for all students," according to Lynne Star, Special Education Instructional Supervisor. "The solution to an accessibility consideration doesn't always involve an expensive, high-tech piece of specialized equipment. Many times, it involves a simple, easy solution involving something as common as colored tape or the type of switches used on a piece of equipment."

The need for assistive technology is discussed and determined during the evaluation process for students with an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP) or 504

"The student's IEP or 504 Plan team meets and follows the SETT (Student, Environment, Tasks, and Tools) Framework, to help identify if assistive technology or services are needed for the student to ensure the student has the access and supports needed to excel in a class or activity," said Dr. Marsha Kloss, Special Education Instructional Supervisor.

In addition to making district schools as accessible as possible during the school day, the district works hard to make after-school clubs and activities accessible to students of all abilities. One such activity that is really popular with students of all abilities is eSports offered as a high school activity at both the East and West High Schools.

"ESports levels that playing field for students of all abilities," said Jonathan Reifer, Special Education Instructional Supervisor. "All of the high school Life Skills students are participating in eSports. ESports is providing a great mentoring opportunity for our Life Skills students. They have an activity where they feel at home and where they have something in common with all the other students in eSports. It's a huge success so far.

As assistive and adaptive technology has become more available, the district has expanded its use beyond iPads and communication devices, to ensure students of all abilities have access to the classes and activities they enjoy at school.

"The art room is a place where all students are welcome and included," said Mrs. Callahan. "No matter who they are, where they come from, what makes them different, or what abilities they have, all students can create something in my classes. It [the specialized pottery wheel] makes it possible for our classes to become a place where everyone belongs and each student is an important part of our classroom family. It's probably my favorite thing about being an art teacher -- we get the amazing opportunity to see all students create something that wasn't there before."
